that night and Tenants Harbour on Thursday, to be in position to scoot into Rockland the next morning.

So I forgot about Damariscove and headed for Farnham Cove, a small harbor on the Damariscotta River. There I found the mooring for a friend's boat unoccupied. "Hmm," I thought, "let's look at the pennant and see how much growth it has." Oops--none. "Maybe I better not use it; they might be back. Of course, I could always apologize & move."

In the midst of this mental debate, I saw a man on a dock waving his arms at me. I sailed over, and he told me that my friend just left on a cruise yesterday and I should use the mooring--score! And better yet, he said that someone had inspected it just last week. So I settled down for the night and fired up the grill.

The next morning, I really want to head out. The weather forecast was nasty for the afternoon with the likelihood of strong thunderstorms (which I had my fill of earlier in the season). But I figured that if I want to be in Rockland for the tall ships, maybe I could get as far as Maple Juice Cove on the St. George and hunker down there. decided, "This is dumb," and headed back to the mooring, where I spent a lovely day and got a lot done, both on my summer writing project and on the boat, with only a few drops of rain.

By this point, I had given up on the tall ships, and just want to get to Rockland so I could rendezvous with my car and get a variety of things I had left in it. On Friday I got up to the lobster boat alarm, and headed out about 7:30. I wasn't really paying much attention to the time, since I figured it was hopeless to get to Portland on time.

Somewhere around noon, I was at the south end of Muscle Ridge Channel, and as I neared the northern end, what did I spy but schooners with lots of sails.

I couldn't have timed it better if I'd been trying!

I sailed out into the approach to the harbour, just as the first of them was approaching. I asked a guy on a small schooner what the plan was and he told me where they were planning on sailing. I motored out toward them (they were motoring too, since the wind that had been on my nose for the last couple hours had now died), taking pix as I went. I didn't have the good camera with me, but at least I had one of those one-use ones. Then I discovered that I could motor faster than they were going, so I got ahead of them to be in position for more pictures.

There were about a dozen of them and every time one passed the Rockland Light, a cannon was fired. They filed into the harbour, and then gathered over on the north side of the harbour. I ran out of film way too soon (I need to get serious about getting a digital camera), but I have more pictures of the sight of the massed schooners stored in my memory.
